Gospel Reading: John 20: 19 - 31

The disciples were afraid of the Jewish leaders, and on the evening of that same Sunday they locked themselves in a room. Suddenly, Jesus appeared in the middle of the group. He greeted them and showed them his hands and his side. When the disciples saw the Lord, they became very happy. After Jesus had greeted them again, he said, "I am sending you, just as the Father has sent me." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. **23** If you forgive anyone's sins, they will be forgiven. But if you don't forgive their sins, they will not be forgiven." Although Thomas the Twin was one of the twelve disciples, he wasn't with the others when Jesus appeared to them. So they told him, "We have seen the Lord!" But Thomas said, "First, I must see the

nail scars in his hands and touch them with my finger. I must put my hand where the spear went into his side. I won't believe unless I do this!" A week later the disciples were together again. This time, Thomas was with them. Jesus came in while the doors were still locked and stood in the middle of the group. He greeted his disciples and said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and look at my hands! Put your hand into my side. Stop doubting and have faith!" Thomas replied, "You are my Lord and my God!" Jesus said, "Thomas, do you have faith because you have seen me? The people who have faith in me without seeing me are the ones who are really blessed!" Jesus worked many other miracles for his disciples, and not all of them are written in this book. But these are written so that you will put your faith in Jesus as the Messiah and the Son of God. If you have faith in him, you will have true life. **

Message: "Believing Into Christ"

We all know Thomas as the "doubting" Thomas. We might assume this identity as Jesus' disciple is created from this story. Thomas is largely a background character throughout the Gospel of John, but he does a fair amount to drive the narrative forward. Take the story of Lazarus, for example, when Jesus says, "Let us go to Jerusalem." Thomas says, "Let us also go, that we may die with him".

In this comment Thomas' character shows leadership. Going to Jerusalem would not be a passive journey, according to Thomas. Using the words, "let us go", indicates leadership. Thomas is driving the story forward, with this short sentence that becomes so full of meaning. Thomas' phrase, "Let us also go, that we may die with him," triggers everything that follows in the Gospel of John. Thomas shows leadership.

If we think about it, Thomas' doubt is also alive in the majority of the other disciples! Look at last week's story when Mary's resurrection story is discounted by the disciples. We even have some doubts about some of Jesus' stories. We think we need to figure it all out – that we have to have all the answers.

We try to make sense of Jesus' miracles. Can we accept them for what they are – miracles. Even in our present day miracles, like times when people are totally healed of cancer, we try to explain how it happened. Few doctors are willing to say, "It's a miracle"! We too have our doubts. We know Thomas as "doubting Thomas." We too should add "Doubting" to our name. "Hi, my name is Doubting Eric."

Let examine Thomas' doubts and his encounter with the risen Christ a week later. Thomas wants to see Jesus' wounds – No - Thomas want to touch Jesus' wounds. Thomas needs to feel the wounds to know they are real, and that Jesus is real. Thomas' touch may be more of an intimate feel – maybe like a hug – the sharing of a brotherly love. Could Thomas not believe, by just seeing his wounds? We are about to find out!

We may note that each time Jesus meets the disciples, Jesus wishes them peace. At many larger church services, the "Passing of the Peace of Christ" becomes part of their worship. Passing the peace could be similar to Thomas needing to touch Jesus' body. To know this is real – that you are real.

In our rural churches we have already talked to each other before church - we have shook their hands or given them a hug. We have already identified that they are real. We have already checked them out – and the service has not started yet. That is kind of how it was with Thomas. He came to church late. He will have to wait for the greetings and touches. We know the greetings and touches will come, but Thomas has to wait. Thomas wants proof that Jesus is back from the dead, before he can trust what his friends are saying.

It is a week later when Thomas gets his proof. Jesus appears to the disciples again and wishes them peace – then Jesus looks right at Thomas, calls his name, and invites Thomas to touch his wounds. Thomas a week earlier was so determined to see Jesus and touch his wounds, but now that Jesus is in front of him, addresses him directly and by name, Thomas no longer needs to touch the wounds. Jesus shows up and calls us by name, and we are good to go – we believe. We like Thomas, may even have an epiphany. We too might shout those words, "You are my Lord and my God!"

"Doubting Thomas" is the first disciple to say out loud, "Jesus is Lord and God". Jesus replies, "Thomas, do you have faith because you have seen me? The people who have faith in me without seeing me are the ones who are really blessed!" It is suggested that the Greek word is best translated as "happy," "content," or "at peace". At peace — is this the kind of peace Jesus gives us? We may know people who have that simple kind of faith, the kind that doesn't ask questions or have doubts or require evidence – these people can be pretty undisturbed, blissfully happy, even. But is that the goal for all of us?

The United Church encourages us to ask the questions – maybe even to look and see – touch if you can. Can we be a "Doubting Eric" and still believe? Does doubt erode our conviction of faith? Are we less of a Christian? Are we really a believer if we doubt? What is John trying to tell us? Should we all believe without seeing,

without reasoning or questioning? I don't think anyone in the Easter story believes like that. It takes Jesus' voice to bring Mary around to recognition. Peter and the other disciple require a glimpse into the tomb, and even then they don't understand. The other disciples need Jesus to show up miraculously in their midst. Thomas' request to see and touch the resurrected Jesus is another way that Thomas and us, might move from doubt to belief in order to follow Jesus.

We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God!
